

The History

Auckland City versus Blockhouse Bay Community

In the early 1950's the area of land bounded by Donovan St, Whitney St, Blockhouse Bay Rd, and Terry St, was known as Block 76. It had been "Grudges Farm" and the Auckland City Council, under the guidance of Sir John Allum, decided that rather than use the area as originally planned for sporting activities, it would make better sense to sell it to the NZ Government for state housing, and so improve finances of the entire Auckland City at the expense of Blockhouse Bay residents.

Fred Johnston, who would later become secretary of the BHB Bowling Club, formed the BHB Ratepayers Assn. to confront the Auckland City Council and insist that the land be used for the good of the whole Community as a sporting complex. Ratepayers could join for a florin (now 20c).

Discussions and confrontations with the Mayor and Councillors were somewhat tense as the majority of Councilors, who were members of the Progressive Ratepayers Assn., resided in the Eastern Suburbs and had little respect for the BHB Community situated on a limb far out in the West of Auckland City.

In 1954, John Luxford was elected Mayor of Auckland, and within a month met representatives of the BHB Ratepayers Assn. to decide on the future of Block 76. This meeting took place in Bill Woods old shed on the corner of Exminster St. and Rathlin St. The new mayor was accompanied by Mr Dickinson, the City Engineer and Mr Mc Farlane head of the Parks Division. The BHB Ratepayers were represented by Fred Johnson and George Wright.

After much debate it was agreed that the Mayor would put the case to the full Council although he could not guarantee the future of Block 76. Without the efforts of the local ratepayers and the persuasion of John Luxford, it is doubtful that Lot 76 would ever have been established for sporting activities in the District. In fact it would be apt to rename the reserve "The John Luxford Reserve".

Late in 1956 the Auckland City Council agreed that an area within Lot 76 should be set aside for a Bowling Club. This area would be large enough to accommodate three greens a pavilion and a provision for car parking.

A similar block of land was allocated for a tennis club at the same time. In actual fact the Tennis Club was the first to get established.

The Beginning

On the 17th December 1956 the group of residents who wanted to form a new Bowling Club had their first meeting at the Pohutukawa Garage situated in the Main Street of the BHB Shopping Centre. It was then owned by Fred Hinton.

Mr Strath Ewing who was at that time a member of the Balmoral Bowling Club, although living in the Bay, was elected as the first President.

Those in attendance were:-

The Blockhouse Bay Bowling Club

An important meeting was held on 20th October 1958 when the Men's Bowling Club was officially formed. However it was not until 1959 that the new Club applied for and obtained a Certificate of Incorporation. This was issued on 5th March 1959.

The foundation members paid one guinea (\$2.10) each to cover initial formation expenses.

The first annual subscriptions were set as follows:-

Foundation members — £6-0-0 New members — £7-0-0

(All subs. Subject to 10/- reduction if paid within one month)

All of those present agreed to canvas the entire district to encourage new members to join.

The secretary was authorized to write to the Director of Parks, Auckland City (Mr McPherson), and inform him that this committee would like to set up a meeting to discuss matters relating to the building of Bowling Greens and a Club pavilion. It was also resolved that a further request would involve setting aside an area to be used for a Ladies Green.

A list of questions were prepared to discuss with the Auckland City Parks Department.

A Bowling Club Is Started

Strath Ewing, Fred Johnston, and Lew Rose, spent a vast amount of their own time and energy planning and organizing the new Greens and Pavilion. Meetings were held regularly with the City Council, the Auckland Bowling Centre Turf Committee, and Mr G Walker of Massey College with respect to the preparation and laying the greens while plans were also prepared for Auckland City Council to approve the construction of a pavilion.

Construction Begins

The speed of construction started to gather momentum in the following months. On 11th December 1958 a tender for the construction of two greens was accepted and on 14th January 1959 a bulldozer turned the first soil to begin levelling the site.

Meanwhile a huge proportion of the new greens were completed with voluntary labour. Working bees were frequent. The new greens were nurtured, banks were formed, seats were made and concrete paths were laid.

On 24th August 1959 a tender of £1470 was accepted for steelwork for the new Club pavilion. Another for £1802 was accepted for the concrete work.

Apart from being the club President Strath Ewing was also Greens Superintendent, Tournament Convener, and Match Committee Chairman. He even carried out most of the maintenance.






Progress with the Pavilion

This project proceeded with the enthusiastic support of both the Ladies and the Men's Clubs. Most members donated their time and energy by either attending working parties every weekend, or in the case of the Ladies, were busy raising money at the shopping centres by running cake and produce stalls and selling raffle tickets or second-hand clothing.

In 1960 the planned size of the pavilion was reduced as insufficient finance was available to complete the pavilion in its entirety. The foundations and steel portals had been completed although a large section of the new pavilion was abandoned to the right, and the various photographs illustrate this decision. After several years the whole pavilion as originally planned was finally completed

Even with the reduced size progress slowed for several months in 1961 so the Auckland City Council provided assistance to get the job completed for the Official Opening on 29th September 1962

Women of the Greens Seeing Red

The men and women bowlers at the Blockhouse Bay Bowling Club are at odds over their housekeeping and have asked the Auckland City Council to arbitrate.

The dispute between the two groups is over the contribution the women's bowling club makes to the men's club for the upkeep of the joint facilities. The men gained their licence in 1962 and the women got their sublicence in 1965.

the women agreed to pay the men an annual sum of £300 towards the expenses, repairs and maintenance of the men's club, pavilion, bowling greens and other property. The women also agreed for the men's club on Saturday afternoons and to assist with kitchen duties at the Sunday tournaments, except during the Christmas recess.

Reporting to the council parks and recreation committee yesterday, the parks operations officer, ir P. J. Hubbers, noted that the catering requiretents probably conflicted ith recent human rights gislation.

He also noted that there was no equivalent clause in the dominant, or men's, licence requiring the men to act as bar stewards for the women's club days.

Bowls club battle of sexes

A bowling green may be ar unlikely battle ground for the war of the sexes — but it's happening

The Auckland City Council has been asked to appoint an arbitrator to settle a dispute between the men's and women's sections of the Blockhouse Bay Bowling Club.

The dispute relates to the women's financial contribution to the club's upkeep. Apparently

A Ladies Club is Formed

On July 18th 1957 a meeting was convened at Hinton's garage to discuss the formation of a Women's Bowling Club at Blockhouse Bay. There were fifteen foundation members and the joining fee was 10/6 per member. The following Committee was elected.

President Mrs. Betty Rose.

Secretary/Treasurer Mrs. Daisy Polkinghorne.

Committee Mesdames K Dougherty, V March, J Moffat.

Advertisements were placed in the Avondale Advance Newspaper, a slideshow was put on at the Kosy Theatre. This resourceful committee even tried unsuccessfully to encourage Selwyn Toogood and Jack Maybury to put on a quiz show to raise funds. The first annual subscription for Lady members was fixed at £4-10-0d. Competition entry was 2/- and the locker fee was 2/6.

At a combined meeting the Ladies and the Men's committees agreed to work together for the benefit of both clubs. A fund raising committee set up, housie and card evenings, raffles ,fairs, second hand clothing sales, film evenings, jumble sales. Cake and produce stalls were regularly held in the shopping centre at Blockhouse Bay. On 5th August 1960 a stall was erected and manned in the Auckland Town Hall. This effort raised £99-7-6d

In September of 1958 the Ladies were given the right to play on the newly formed greens until such time as a separate green was prepared and finished for the Ladies Club. In November of 1958 the area which is now the Club's artificial green was levelled for the Ladies Club to eventually use as their own Club green.


This never actually happened as planned. Instead, in 1965 both Clubs drew up a formal agreement, under the control of the Auckland City Council, whereby the Ladies would pay £300 annually towards the running costs of the Men's Club. This agreement was detailed enough to allow the Ladies free and uninterrupted use of the greens on certain days and specified what parts of the new Clubhouse would be for their exclusive use. The £300 was a fair and reasonable amount to pay in 1958, but inflation overtook this amount so by 1978 the ladies Club were voluntarily paying more and as much as \$1815 per annum. In the 70's inflation was rampant in NZ and the Men's Club wanted more than the Ladies were offering so they asked the Ladies to change the agreement and pay a fixed percentage of total club annual operating expenses, 25% of the previous year's figures. The list of expenses to be used were:—Wages, Council Loan, Insurances, Electric Power, Water, Cleaning Costs, Repairs and Maintenance, Greens Maintenance. 25% of these costs in 1977/78 amounted to \$2500.

The Ladies disagreed and offered \$2000 per annum plus 20% of their excess income for the preceding year. The men said "No" and headed off to arbitration in accordance with the sharing agreement originally drawn up by the Auckland City Council.


They even had "Headlines" in the NZ Herald, **Women of the Greens Seeing Red,** and in the Auckland Star, **Bowls Club Battle of Sexes.**

Although the City Council appointed a Mr. L E Adams as arbitrator who started collecting information regarding the dispute he eventually came to the conclusion that he was not "legally" able to adjudicate as the matter in dispute had not actually been defined. For legal reasons the Council refused to pass on any details of Mr. Adams reports.

He withdrew as arbitrator on 12th September 1979 and instead offered to help both Committees come to a mutual understanding until the Council lease was renewed in 1983.

The Ladies were asked to attend such a meeting. This request was then discussed at their own AGM in November 1979 when it as decided that is was not appropriate for the Ladies Club to submit to such a request.

It is not clear why this decision was made but the entire confrontation appears to have lapsed until a new lease agreement was drawn up by the Auckland City Council in 1983 after the original agreement had expired.

This new agreement included a clause for both Clubs to co-exist "by continuing their close and harmonious association in the interests of furthering the game of bowls". This agreement also states that the Women's Club would pay to the Men's Club an annual fee calculated by multiplying the total number of their playing members by 70% of the Men's annual subscription as fixed at the men's AGM. This arrangement continued to work well and without incident until amalgamation with the Men's Club in 2007.

The Dress Code for Ladies

The dress code for Women's Clubs was very strict in the early days of the BHB Club.

- 1. White or cream tailored frocks.
- 2. Frocks must have a collar
- 3. Skirt length to measure twelve inches from the hem to the ground. This length to be checked regularly by officials on the greens.
- 4. All frocks to be worn only with matching under-garment.
- 5. White wide-brimmed hats complete with Club hat band.
- 6. White stockings.
- 7. No jewellery except a wrist watch and a wedding ring.

In 1965 the wearing of stockings became optional and in the intervening years the regulations have been relaxed to permit navy trousers, shorts, and coloured shirts.

Amalgamation

With pressure mounting from the Auckland Bowling Centre and with the slackening of hardened attitudes, especially from male bowlers, the decision to amalgamate the Blockhouse Bay Bowling Club and the Blockhouse Bay Womens Bowling Club became a reality.


In May 2006 The Blockhouse Bay Women's Bowling Club and the Blockhouse Bay Bowling Club (Men) voted in favour of amalgamation and the renaming of the merged Clubs became



THE MONDAY BOYS

On any Monday morning throughout the year if you go up to the BHB Clubhouse you will find the shed door open and various members of the Club scattered around the grounds involved in a variety of jobs. Mowing the lawns, cutting hedges, repairing whatever needs fixing, cleaning, painting, the list goes on and on.

This dedicated group have come together over the years with new faces arriving as others depart. The group also includes some of the ladies who join in to tend the gardens and provide morning tea.

By far the most outstanding of these has been Tom Vincent. A member from 1978 – 2008. With Bob Watts Treasurer and Ray Dixon Secretary and others, Tom instigated negotiations that culminated in the laying of our first artificial green. Most of the planning and work was done by Tom who organised cut-price deals through his work place. He was also heavily involved with the renovation of "B" Green.

A man who could turn his hand to anything, Tom designed and built much of the Club's specialised machinery. He would even modify his own designs and proprietary equipment when he felt the original could be improved. Tom could often be seen in the shed stripping and cleaning any of this equipment just to ensure it was kept in first class working order.


A modest man, Tom was quick to acknowledge the work put in by others. He was President in the 1982/83 season and again in the 1988/89 season. He was awarded Life Membership in 1991. A fitting reward for his great contribution to the Club.

When "C" green was opened in 1990, three of the "Monday Boys", added to their regular Monday activity a Wednesday period to clean up the pine needles and debris deposited on the surface of this green just before each midweek "Roll-Up". These three were Colin Rokela, Ross Brewin and Murray Jacomb.

"The Monday Boys" is a "Club" within the Club as there is no doubt that this team enjoy the opportunity to meet socially each week, have a chat, and at the same time keep the Clubhouse and the Greens and surroundings looking immaculate.

Any member is welcome to join the "Club". Entry is free and there is no annual subscription to pay. Many others have joined and departed over the years; all of whom have enjoyed putting something back into their Club just by helping with a few "chores". Page 17

The Building of "C" Green-1989



The Artificial Green

In June 1989 an intense period of expenditure was underway with several projects either nearing completion and others under consideration.

In 1986 the cool-room and bar renovations had been completed at a cost of \$10,688.90. The third green was in hot demand as were improvements to the hall and the kitchen. The membership was at full capacity and closed.

Money was tight and the Club had a loan for \$80,000 that was due to be repaid in September 1991. Despite this the executive was given approval at the AGM in June of 1989 to go ahead and install a revolutionary new artificial surfaced bowling green on the undeveloped "C" green site.

On 1st March 1990 Roy Dickson, the Secretary, wrote to the Auckland City Council and asked if the Council would agree to accept an immediate repayment of \$10,000 and accept repayment of the remaining \$70,000 over a five year period instead of in September 1991 as originally agreed. \$30,000 was required for sealing the car-park and \$140,000 for the new artificial green.

A bus load of forty-one members had already travelled to the Manly Bowling Club and were ecstatic about getting an "all weather" bowling green installed at Blockhouse Bay. The costs were:-

Preparation	\$40,000 + GST
Foundations and Laying of "Astrograss"	\$75,610 + GST
Perimeter Fencing and Paving	\$8,430 + GST
Total	\$124,040 + GST

The Women's Bowling Club contributed \$15,000, and the Auckland Bowling Centre gave a loan of \$7000 for drainage.

On 7th May 1990 the Western Leader published a large photograph of the new "all-weather" green at the BHB Bowling Club. This was hailed as the first of it's kind in the Auckland City. "Costing approximately \$140,000 this all-weather maintenance free sand based green, means that members can now play all year round, even in the rain."


"The Club has two Cotula greens and consideration may be given to changing them into all-weather greens in a few years time. If this is done maintenance costs will drop sharply and will have the effect of reducing subscriptions to members. The Club also has plans to improve its clubhouse accommodation as it expects to open and increase its membership which has been "full" for the past seven seasons. If all these plans are carried out over a five year period the total cost will be about \$500,000 without any additional cost to members."

Sixteen Clubs were represented in the first tournament. It was Men's Fours, played on 29th April 1990. Although a fine day, violent electrical storms the previous evening had forced fourteen other clubs with Cotula greens to cancel. Not a drop of water could be found on the new BHB green which played perfectly. There was much favourable comment from the other clubs represented.

A year later the new green had proved it's worth when it was announced that forty-four tournaments had been held over the last winter and thirty new members had been admitted because twelve months bowling had been possible.

Although the new artificial green was initially believed to be the ultimate all weather all seasons "bowlers dream green" it began deteriorate within five years due to the inability of the polypropylene surface to withstand the high concentration of ultra violate sunlight over New Zealand. The first Astroturf green was therefore replaced in 1996 with one which was more suited to NZ conditions. $\frac{1}{2} P_{\text{age } 19}$

The Pine Trees at the back of "C" have been a source of discontent ever since a bowling green was located there. In September 1989 the Blockhouse Bay Community Committee (A locally elected committee under the auspices of the Auckland City Council) called a meeting which was held in the Blockhouse Bay Community Centre to exchange all points of view regarding a request from the Bowling Club to have the pine trees felled.

The response from nearby residents especially those in Rathlin St. was described as "sharp". Some nearby residents wanted the trees trimmed to let the sun through while others further away wanted the trees to stay. The Parks Department said the trees were about 60 yrs. old and should live to 120 yrs. The Bowling Club represented by Ray Dixon wanted to arrange a compromise. As can been seen today, nothing was achieved on this occasion.

In 1996 another attempt was made to have the "pine trees" felled. Photographs showing the mess after a "big blow" were shown to the Council. They in turn passed the matter onto the Environmental Committee who then reported that the trees had a further life expectancy of 30 to 40 years. They would anticipate taking out five of the trees within the next 5 to 10 years.

In April of 2002 the executive decided to approach the Council and ask for the removal of some pines as indicated six years before. This time it seems the trees would be felled but the Council did not have sufficient funds to cover the cost.

By the Club offering to pay \$20,000 towards the cost of removal in 2008 the Council it seems are starting to demonstrate a wiliness to remove at least some of these trees.



A "New Generation" Artificial Surface

By 2006 it was becoming evident that the much vaunted sand filled artificial surface on "C" green was not only being surpassed by more modern technology but the green itself was nearing the end of its useful life.

The Club Executive set about calling in quotations and opinions on the several new artificial surfaces available. There were failures with new artificial greens

being experienced by other clubs that were sorted through. Prices were gathered, talked through, and finally presented to the members at a Special General Meeting

in November 2007. The recommended option which was given full approval by the members was a Greenweave woven carpet.

After some minor delays the new "Tiger Turf" was installed and ready to use in June 2008. The full cost was \$150,838. A substantial grant of \$100,000 towards the cost was received from the Portage Licensing Trust.

The technology used is quite different



to that used

for the old "Astrograss" surface. Briefly, the compacted sand under Astrograss is replaced with a 7mm stone chip. It is compacted and levelled with a sophisticated machine which is guided by a laser beam. After levelling is completed the perfectly flat surface is sprayed with a "two-pot" resin to fix it in place while leaving the surface porous for rainwater to pass through.

A polypropylene underfelt is then laid as with a domestic carpet, and the top

finished carpet is made from a woven green polypropylene yarn. Domestic carpets made this way are generally referred to as "Wilton" woven carpets as opposed to the normal "tufted" carpet.

Put all the technical details aside and the final result is very close to a "firstclass" grass green. There have been no adverse comments on this new surface which like the original has made Blockhouse Bay Bowls the envy of all other Auckland Clubs.

1961

Terry Indoor Bowls started. Good revenue source. Run by George Richardson.

14th July 1962

Auckland City Council assist with the completion of the new pavilion.

29th September 1962

Official Opening of the Pavilion

1963

A shed was purchased from Auckland Harbour Board for £105 to be used as a soil and implement shed. The concrete floor was laid by members.

1966

The Blockhouse Bay Community held a "Queen Carnival". The Bowling Club entry was a Miss A Smythe.

20th June 1968

Quotations called to construct a third "all weather green". Cost was \$9000. Grants sought from ASB and Golden Kiwi Lottery Board. No success.

1969

Johnathan Hunt MP donated a Trophy to the Ladies—"Graded Drawn Fours" A member, Bob Eccesfield, donated a trophy for a Saturday novelty game— "Poms versus The Kiwis"

The Johnson Cup for Veterans was presented by Mr Hanson A "Ways & Means" committee was formed to to raise funds for important projects such as the planned extensions to the pavillion.

1971

Pavilion extensions and the resiting of the soil shed with roof raised approved.

1973

Special gratitude expressed to Colin Gordon, who whilst being a member of the Glen Eden Bowling Club, voluntarily completed electrical work in the Club lounge, thus saving the BHB Bowling Club hundreds of dollars.

Oct 1976

Approval given to Indoor Bowling Club to put down a wooden floor in the hall over the concrete floor.

1978

Six bus shelters purchased at \$15.00 each delivered, to be used around the greens.

1978

Lion Breweries provided architectural design services and financial assistance to install cool room and beer tanks subject to the Club being granted an "ancillary license". This was approved from July 1979.

1980

Merv Hinton to clear back area, now "C" green, to provide more parking at a cost of \$150

A stainless steel bench was installed in the kitchen by Tom Vincent at a cost of \$250. (Really worth \$1000)

1982

The parking area was levelled and metalled at a cost of \$1834 Removal of the lounge partition separating the Ladies and the Mens Clubs suggested, provided a separate Match Committee room is built.

1983

The Piper family donated a trophy for a competition between Men & Women. "Punch" who was a valued and active member had "passed away" the year before.

May 1983

A 25th Jubilee "Project" approved to set up a new soil shed and ancillary equipment. Total cost \$30,000.

1984

Existing soil and implement shed to be replaced with a larger shed built with concrete blocks.

A crib wall, estmated to cost \$8000 was also needed along the Western boundary. The ACC could not offer money but would instead provide PEP labour to make "crib" blocks and dig foundations. Tom Vincent made a "block mold" at a cost of \$7500. The Council were paid \$5500 to supply professional engineering and supervision of construction.

This whole exercise worked out to be considerably less expensive than paying Gibbons Construction who had quoted \$58,399.90 for the same job.

The soil shed reconstruction was on hold until the wall was built. In the meantime soil was being barrowed through the lounge to the greens.

6th June 1985

A document, "Future of the Club" was prepared and presented to members by a sub-committee chaired by A.A. Dodds (Club President 87/88) It was noted that the members were ageing and less inclined to do the hard manual work required.

A Council house on the Eastern side of the entrance is in bad shape and therfore likely to be demolished.

It was noted that 1/3 of total income is derived from bar sales, so a bigger and better lounge is necessary.

Friday night "nibbles" well received but something "hot" would be welcomed in the winter months.

Need to improve beer handling equipment overdue.

If and when the Club grows with the installation of three greens, exra seating will be necessary and the kitchen would need relocating and upgrading to cope with at least 200.

Hall hireage rates considered to be too low.

Indoor Bowling Club has a membership of 100 after 20yrs. 70% are also members of the two Bowling Clubs. When running open tounraments they can cater for 112 players at one time. Income from Indoor Bowls for last five years, \$5400.00. All equipment belongs to the Men's Bowling Club.

1986

Membership remained closed from 1983 with both Clubs together, totalling almost 300 members.

Planning in place to convert greens to Cotula.

Work commenced on the cool room and bar alterations. The estimated cost was \$10,688.90.

Priorities set for:-

Third green with artificial surface. (Estimated cost \$100,000) Relocation of kitchen

Parking areas

Member, Les Sherwood, donated a trophy for "Men's Championship Triples" 3rd Aug 1988

Approval to install gaming machines sought from members.

The cost of a reconditioned machine was \$4500, a new machine cost \$9000. The license fee was \$400 while the annual fee was \$100 for each machine installed.

Approved and two machines were purchased.

13th June 1989

Members Pauline and Gordon Wilkinson donated \$10,000 to assist with the cost of building foundation of the new "C" green.

27th May 1989

Proposed alterations to the interior of the Club Rooms started to stall when representatives of the Women's Club at a combined meeting said that they were advised by their solicitor to listen but not to vote on any proposals. Two further attempts were made to get formal approval from the Women's Bowling Club without success despite the fact the Ladies had verbally given their approval. According to the minutes no reply was ever received from the BBWBC.

Sept 1989

Auckland City Council agree to lend BHB Bowling Club a sum of \$80,000 for two years at 10% interest. The money was required to help finance the new "C" green.

9th to 21st Jan 1990

XIV Commonwealth Games—The BHB Bowling Club hosted the Canadian Team of 7 Men and 7 Women plus 2 Managers.

Canadian flags were flown, and regular competitions were arranged together with sightseeing tours.

5th July 1990

A plan to redesign the pavilion was accepted by both Clubs but still never formally agreed to by the Women's Club.

1st March 1990

Auckland City agree to extend two year loan to five years

8th Sept 1990

A Special AGM was held to consider and approve the new concept for the pavilion as illustrated. All members were sent a small copy of the plan and a larger copy was displayed on the Club notice board.

A quotation from Batley Builders was accepted for a total of \$55,383.75 incl. GST. in October 1990.



1990

The Council Parks Dept supplied 350 plants and shrubs for the banks and perimeter of the Club grounds.

1993

Alterations to interior of the Clubhouse completed with all members being extremely impressed.

1994

Council agree to install lighting on RHS of entrance and to seal remainder of driveway.

1995

Old shed removed from under the Totara trees at top of drive.

2000

ASB make a grant to assist with makeover of "B" green.

Replacement of toilet facilities completed. The services of Al Grace, Brian Harris and Arthur Lane were acknowledged.

The BHB Soccer Club were invited to make use of the Club facilities.

2001

The efforts of Tom Vincent regarding his untiring efforts on the "B" green makeover were formally acknowledged.

A further three poker machines at a cost of \$5000 each were purchased. 2nd Feb 2002

A touring party of twenty-four Bowlers from Jersey (Channel Isles) were hosted by the Club.

March 2002

The subject of amalgamating the Men's and the Women's Clubs was raised. "B" green drainage completed.

Mrs Colin Thomson donated a trophy to replace the shield used for Men's Championship Fours.

Aug 2002

The existing gaming machines to be phased out by 2004 and replaced with more up-to-date models.

Dec 2002

Installation of Sky television postponed because executive could not justify cost benefits.

Nov 2003

New cool room installed behind the bar.

April 2004

A cost of under \$10,000 for some additional shelters was submitted by Tom Vincent, Al Grace, George Wallace and Bill Fergusson.

Approval was given and these would be installed before the winter.

The Turf institute rated the Club greens in the "Top Ten" in Auckland New carpet laid in the lounge. Approach made to Portage Trust for assistance to purchase Chairs and Tables at a cost of \$21,555

Sept 2004

A plastic awning installed to provide an outside lounge area for smokers.

April 2005

New 60inch Sony LCD TV was installed in the lounge. The executive accepted an offer from Robyn Cross to pay the Sky reception fee for twelve months.

April 2006

At a Special AGM formal approval was given to amalgamate the two Clubs under a revised Constitution.

Aug 2006

First edition of Club bulletin, "Roll-Up", published and edited by Roger Pye.

5th May 2007

Plans for Kitchen and Bar upgrade presented to members.

June 2007

Blockhouse Bay Bowls named "Club of the Year—2006/07" at Auckland Bowls annual awards luncheon.

3rd Sept 2007

New tables installed in the Hall.

Avondale Community Trust agree to pay up to \$27,000 for installation of lights over the carpark by "C" green.

3rd Dec 2007

New Club shirts and logo for amalgamated Club approved.

31st Jan 2008

A tour party of forty members from "The Friendship Foundation" of Jersey (Channel Isles) visit again.

March 2008


